Roundtable at ESSA Annual Business Meeting in Boston

The Annual ESSA Business Meeting has been scheduled for 4:15 - 6:15 on Saturday afternoon November 16, 1996. The meeting will include the following roundtable discussion:

Since the 1992 publication of the two-volume *Catalog: Manuscripts on Microform of the Hilandar Research Library* (HRL), the library has acquired roughly one-fourth (if not more) as many Cyrillic manuscripts - mainly from Russia and Poland. Mary-Allen Johnson will open the roundtable with a brief description of these newly acquired collections. Next, Daniel Collins will discuss the hagiographies in these collections - in particular, the numerous 16th and 17th-century Russian *zhitiia* which have never been published, and are among the manuscripts of the Saratov collection. Jeffrey Otto will talk about the edicts and other legal documents available in the HRL; Jennifer Anderson will report on the HRL printed book collection. Festschrift for Edward L. Keenan

The Harvard Ukrainian Research Institute announces the publication of Volume 19 (1995), *Rhetoric of the Medieval Slavic World: Essays presented to Edward L. Keenan on his Sixtieth Birthday by his Colleagues and Students*, edited by Nancy Shields Kollmann, Donald Ostrowski, Andrei Pliguzov and Daniel B. Rowland. In tribute to Professor Keenan, his colleagues and students have dedicated to him these essays on medieval Slavic history, literature, philology and related areas. The volume will include a bibliography of Professor Keenan's publications as well as excerpts from his scholarly correspondence.

Message from Germany

Professor Helmut Neubauer, Professor emeritus (Heidelberg), very kindly, and faithfully, serves as one of the *Newsletter's* "correspondents" in Germany.
